head up our September DTS school. We definitely feel like God is in the process of building us up again!

God's answer to our prayers:

This outreach was different and a challenge from the start. Unable to find a dentist then a couple of nurses dropped out. Fortunately we had a second doctor who wanted to come and some non health professionals had already committed to be here. There was a widespread outbreak of dengue fever and in the area we were going also outbreaks of typhoid and leptospirosis. So what to do? The only thing I could - adapted the team to the needs. I accepted the second doctor for Primary Health Care clinic and ran a reading glasses clinic as this is always a need in villages. The team was small, mostly of a mature age which included my parents which was very special and a big help. When you looked back you see the reasons God has for doing certain things which previously seemed unclear. The lack of dentistry had a huge affect on the numbers of patients through the clinic in the first village, but the less numbers meant more time with the patients and the locals. It also allowed us to see all the 93 school kids and their teachers and bless so many with reading glasses which made their day. We also were able to do multiple home visits which would not normally have been possible.

One of the many stories from the outreach. Who are we serving? Who should be inconvenienced? These are the questions we asked ourselves with one patient. We always swap locations on the Sunday half way through the outreach. Sunday morning we had loaded our medical truck, tied everything down ready to leave. A vehicle drove up and unloaded a man who had fallen the previous day, said he had a stick or twig buried in his foot. We all looked at each other, looked at the truck, looked at the patient and sighed. With some gauze and a pair of tweezers handy we looked at his foot and attempted to remove this stick, it would not budge and the patient could not tolerate the pain. He was going to require some local anaesthetic. Again we thought


should we unpack and look for the supplies we needed? Should we just leave it and tell him to go to the local clinic? Why we are here and who are we meant to be serving? The people in need or our own convenience? It is the people in need. Here is someone who should or could have come to us the previous day but he didn't and he is right before us now needing our help. So we started to untie the truck - not a quick or easy job to find the box with the instruments and supplies we needed. Miraculously as we untied the first part we saw the box we needed right at the front and was able to remove it without dismantling the whole truck. Great! So after giving the man some local anaesthetic and cleaning up the area, with proper forceps this time, we were able to dig deep to remove the large piece of wood that was lodged in his foot. He was very grateful and fortunately we also had some antibiotics left out that we could give to him. So it all worked out and was a good reminder to us that God's work is never to our convenience or timing and the need to be willing and available always.

More stories in brief:

- Dr Anderson removed a large cyst the size of a hand from the top of a man's head in a makeshift clinic behind a curtain. A \$10,000 operation for free because God wants everyone to know they are loved by Him.
- During house to house visitations a man with a stroke was checked and found to have dangerously high blood pressure and sugar levels, his medication had run out and couldn't afford any more, he was in danger of having another stroke.

We arranged a 'quiet' goodbye for Judith as she will return to us later in the year for a time, then back to NZ.

We had a staff BBQ and invited Rob and Lori Leacock (missionaries from the USA-living in Lautoka) and Adam and Kim Atkinson and their children who have just joined 'Island Breeze', another ministry of YWAM in Fiji. We know it has not easy for Judith working for both Marine Reach Fiji and Marine Reach, NZ for the last 6 months, traveling between the two nations and having to head up the medical work in both countries. Judith has been a huge blessing to us and very dedicated to her task of coordinating and leading our medical teams, nothing is ever too much trouble.

Some of our staff went to Bekana Island for a time of "R & R" recently. Bekana is an island resort, which can be seen from the Walu Street lounge window. It ceased to operate about 5 years ago but has been reopened ('resurrected') by a lovely on fire Christian family. They blessed us with free tropical smoothies and Indian savories as we sat on the mat they provided for us under the trees. The Marine Reach kids all had a great time in the sea with the "sea biscuit, paddling the kayaks and mucking around on the jetty. The family are keen to work with us for mutual support and we will certainly be sending more of our staff and teams out to them in future.
